Background: Chris & Wayne Ahlstrom have requested to utilize the road allowance which lies between the NE-7-37-7 W5M & NW-8-37-7 W5M (approximately 800 meters) to gain access to their grazing lease located in the SE-7-37-7 W5M and the SW-8-37-7 W5M. The road allowance has been developed by ConocoPhillips Canada in order to access a well site within the SE-7-37-7 W5M.

ConocoPhillips has indicated, in the attached Notice of Abandonment, the well is no longer capable of economically viable production therefore have decided to abandon the well and are considering options for the surface location and access road. Chris Ahlstrom has been in contact with ConocoPhillips and has requested the use of the access road and well site area in its developed state.



County staff has also been in contract with the ConocoPhillips Canada's recovery and abandonment department, they have expressed no concerns with Chris and Wayne Ahlstrom's application.

ConocoPhillips Canada Operations Corp. has determined that the referenced well is no longer capable of economically viable production and will proceed with the abandonment of the well and reclamation of the respective surface lease. Both the downhole abandonment and surface reclamation will be performed in accordance with regulations and guidelines established by the Energy Resources Conservation Board (ERCB) and by Alberta Environment. Further information on the process of abandonment and reclamation follows.

Downhole Abandonment

In most cases a service rig will be required and in some instances a wireline unit and cement trucks may be necessary to abandon the well as per regulations set out by the ERCB. At the conclusion of the downhole abandonment, the wellhead will be removed and the casing strings will be cut off and capped at least one meter below ground level. Equipment and facilities that are no longer required will be removed from the lease.

The lease will be accessed via the access route illustrated on the attached survey. If you have concerns regarding site access or site entry please contact the company representative listed below.

Pipeline Abandonment

The pipelines associated with this wellsite may be abandoned at a later date. Notification of a pipeline abandonment is done by way of a separate letter and includes a survey plan that shows where the line is located. Abandonment of the pipeline segments consists of the pipeline being cleaned of any residual hydrocarbons utilizing a pigging procedure, removal of the pipeline riser or valve site and cutting and capping the pipeline ends. The line is left filled with air at atmospheric conditions.

In situations where the pipeline will remain in service and will not be abandoned, a riser, header or valve site may remain on the lease. In these cases, a representative of ConocoPhillips' Surface Land Group will contact you to discuss our requirements for leaving these facilities in place.

Site Assessment and Surface Reclamation

Once the equipment and facilities that are no longer required have been removed from the wellsite, site assessment and surface reclamation will begin. Environmental consultants will perform an evaluation of topsoil depth, compaction, soil composition, vegetation and possible presence of residual impacts on the lease associated with our operations. This evaluation will determine the scope of work to be performed.

The work to reclaim the lease will be undertaken using the current guidelines and criteria as detailed in the Reclamation Criteria for Wellsites and Associated Facilities 1995 Update. It is the intent that the lease will be returned to an equivalent land capability similar to that of the surrounding land.

When the reclamation work has been completed, environmental consultants will complete an extensive evaluation of the site to assess vegetation, contour, drainage, soil depths, soil quality and soil compaction. Based on the results of this detailed assessment, ConocoPhillips will determine if the site is satisfactorily reclaimed and an application for a reclamation certificate will be prepared and submitted to Alberta Environment for review and the issuance of a Reclamation Certificate.

If someone other than yourself is farming or occupying the land, please inform them of our proposed activity.



ISOLATED ACCESS ROADS ON RIGHT-OF-WAY

EFFECTIVE DATE: June 1999

Revised: May 8, 2012

SECTION: Public Works

POLICY STATEMENT:

The purpose of this policy is to outline the specifications and considerations required by the Municipality on Isolated Access roads that are to be constructed to a reduced Municipal standard and built on public right-of-way. The primary use of this type of road is to achieve economical physical access to a single parcel in isolated locations with the potential of very limited traffic volumes or where the intended use is not necessarily a benefit to the public as a whole.

PROCEDURE:

All reduced standard access roads must comply with the following specifications.

- 1. The maximum grade that would be allowed on a reduced standard road will be 14%.
- 2. In fill sections that exceed 2m's the Municipality requires that the applicants ensure that the road has sufficient sideslopes or guardrails as determined by the Director of Public Works or his designate.
- In areas where Vertical and Horizontal sight lines are less than 200m's the applicants will be expected to increase the width of road to a minimum of 7.3m(24feet) driving surface to accommodate for two way traffic.
- 4. Right-of-way on most public road allowances is 20.12m's (66feet). All access roads are to be built in the center of the right-of-way unless otherwise approved by the Director of Public Works or his designate.
- 5. Water drainage shall not be impeded by the road development. Sufficient culverts or crossings shall be installed to maintain natural drainage. If required the applicants will be responsible to obtain all Alberta Environmental Protection permits required.
- 6. Posted speed for Isolated Access roads will be 50KM's per hour.
- 7. The applicants will be responsible for supplying "Max50KM/hr" and "Isolated Access Road No Municipal Maintenance" signs at their own cost. The municipality will pass necessary bylaws to implement the 50KM/hr Maximum speed.

- 8. All Isolated Access Roads that enter on to an existing developed "Municipal Road" must enter at a 90 degree angle and have a minimum of 150m's of sight lines in both directions from the point where it enters the municipal road.
- 9. Additional construction, reclamation, erosion mitigation or brushing requirements will be determined on a site specific basis by the Director of Public Works or his designate. All costs associated will be the responsibility of the applicant.
- 10. The Maintenance of Isolated Access Roads will be the sole responsibility and cost of the applicants.(e.g.: grading, snow removal, graveling etc.)
- 11. The applicants of Isolated Access Roads cannot restrict access to public traffic in any way.
- 12. The sole cost of construction of these roads will be the responsibility of the applicants.
- 13. All applicants that apply for an Isolated Access Road will be required to sign an agreement with the Municipality acknowledging the aforementioned requirements.
- 14. It is the responsibility of the applicants to notify any prospective buyers of this property that the above-mentioned agreement exists.
- 15. The Isolated Access Road policy is intended to compliment and work in conjunction with (but is not limited to) the Clearwater County Access Road Policy, Residential Subdivision Standards Policy, Road Standards Policy, Approach Construction Guidelines Policy and the Fencing Policy.

Background:

On July 16th, 2013, Public Works received a request from Mr. Ron Webster, Managing Director of Wilderness Village, on the possibility of their waste water hauling contractor (Redline) having access to the Leslieville Lagoon on Sundays.

The reasons as to why Mr. Webster would like the additional Sunday morning access are as follows:

- 1.) Hauling waste water to Nordegg, on Sunday, takes too much time
- 2.) It would decrease several additional loads having to go to Nordegg
- 3.) It would eliminate having to transfer waste water back and forth between onsite holding tanks in order to make it through Sunday
- 4.) An extremely busy year which has resulted in an increase of waste water.



On July 12th, 2011, Clearwater County Council amended the operational hours of the Leslieville Lagoon, in order to accommodate Wilderness Village, to include Saturday mornings (8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon).

As such, to be open on Sunday mornings (8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon) will require additional staff. Currently Clearwater County hires a seasonal staff member, specifically for monitoring of this receiving station. Asking that individual to work seven days a week is not an option, and with the demand on our other staff, who are working overtime in an attempt to catch up after the Nordegg fire and most recent flood, asking them to cover off this would also create some challenges. It is our position that an additional staff member would need to be hired to accommodate this request. Wilderness Village would be prepared to contribute towards the cost associated with having a Clearwater County employee working an extra half day on Sunday, however, hiring an individual for a half day a week might be challenging.

It is the administrations opinion that there are other options available that would mitigate the issues that Wilderness Village is faced with that would not include having to extend our hours of operation. Example: Hiring of additional trucks, etc...

Clearwater County INCIDENT REPORTING TO COUNCIL POLICY

EFFECTIVE DATE: July 9, 2013 **REVISED:** July 23, 2013

This policy shall clarify when the Safety Coordinator, CAO, and/or Director(s) informs council of incidents.

DEFINITIONS

For the purpose of this Personnel Policy, the following definitions shall apply:

a) <u>Incident:</u> An unplanned event that results in personal injury, resulting in lost time, as defined by the Workers Compensation Board; or damage to equipment, machinery or property exceeding \$2,000.00.

PURPOSE

To provide guidance to the Safety Coordinator, Directors, and CAO as to the type of incidents requiring council notification.

DIRECTIVE

1. In Clearwater County, all incidents shall be fully investigated (unless prime contractor status has been designated); but only those that result in lost time or result in property damage exceeding \$2,000.00 shall be reported to council.

RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. All employees/contractors shall report all incidents to their immediate supervisor and/or the Health & Safety Coordinator.
- 2. The Health & Safety Coordinator shall conduct initial investigations and shall inform council of incidences as per the directive.

Del Ramage, President of 1061814 Alberta Ltd. owns and operates Grandview Stage located at SE 27-38-08-W5. The property is near Cow Lake approximately 8 miles southwest of the Town of Rocky Mountain House adjacent the intersection of SH 752, Range Road 8-2 and Twp Road 38-4.

A recent application to redistrict 1.0 acre containing their residence from the Highway Development District "HD" to the Country Residence District "CR" was given third reading on March 12, 2013. Subsequently an application for subdivision was conditionally approved on April 11, 2013. One condition of the approval was then appealed to the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board. The Appeal Board issued their decision on June 6, 2013 upholding the Municipal Planning Commission's approval. As a result of this decision, the landowner has advised that he does not wish to proceed with the application.

Planning Considerations:

In accordance with Section 12.2(13) Council "If the subdivision or development for which land was redesignated does not occur within one year of the date of passage of the bylaw that redesigned the land, Council may initiate a bylaw to redesignate the land back to its former district." Due to the withdrawal of the application by the landowner, it would be prudent for Council to proceed with redesignating the land back to its former district to conclude this matter.



Background:

Council previously committed to provide matching funding for an expansion to the Kurt Browning Arena. This expansion was to include new change rooms and potential lobby renovations, among other things. Engineering work was conducted and the project was put out to tender. All returned bids were well over budget and a suitably reduced price could not be reached. As such, the original project was cancelled.

As the expansion project was being largely funded through the Major Community Facilities Program (MCFP) grant which has deadline for use, another project was sought. A group from the community is proposing a multi-use building which will house various users such as a playschool, fitness facility, medical clinic and dance studio be constructed and have done a large amount of background work to put a proposal together. Leo Fagnan, Reg Dean and Debbie Northcott are here on behalf of the Caroline HUB Committee to present that proposal.

The delegation will be presenting a project budget which includes the use of volunteers and donations to make up the funding shortfall. As Council will recall, the MCFP for the Arena expansion provided \$500,000.00 which the County opted to fully match (1 to 1



dollar matching was a grant requirement), creating a budget of \$1 Million. Approximately \$944,000.00 is currently remaining and could be used for the proposed HUB should enough donations and community support be received so as to make up the shortfall.

Related to this project is the South East Recreation Grounds which is also being constructed through a second MCFP grant. This project also had a starting budget of \$1 Million, of which approximately \$330,000.00 remains. Initial tenders for the remaining work to be completed were well over the remaining budget. Working with the low bidder, the budget amount was reduced to approximately \$465,000.00 (with other engineering and servicing costs to be added).

The HUB group believes that this project may be able to capitalize on efficiencies and donations created as part of the Complex Expansion taking place. The current estimate for the work is just under \$500,000.00 of which \$330,000.00 is funded. This means a shortfall of \$170,000.00 would need to be covered through work and price efficiencies.

Staff is recommending that Council endorse the Caroline Community Complex expansion and authorize the use of current matching dollars for the project. Staff further recommends that construction on the South East Recreation Grounds also moves forward at the same time in order to realize funding and work efficiencies.

The cost estimate is based on Premier Project Management proposal and also addresses all items not included in the quote. The new parking lot is built to paving standards however for an additional cost of \$210,000 it would have to be paved when more funds are available.

There has been discussion on raising the wall height from 10 feet to 12 feet. In our discussions with fitness studio experts and the dance studio operators, it has been clarified that 10 feet is more than adequate. The estimated additional cost of raising the wall height is between \$75,000 to \$100,000. There are also implications of increase in heating and lighting costs due to this increased height.

Background:

The County is currently acting as the project manager for an expansion taking place at the Caroline Community Complex. Additionally, work is being proposed for the nearby South East Recreation Grounds, specifically a concession/washroom facility.

Council will recall that both of these projects are primarily being funded through the Major Community Facility Program grant received from the Province. In order to move forward with these projects, the County must enter into agreements with a contractor for the work.

Premier Building Solutions has been selected as the service provider and has forwarded two contracts – one for each project – for construction management services Premier has proposed a budget of \$74,000.00 for the Caroline Community Complex expansion and \$71,000.00 for the South East Recreation Grounds project.



In review of the documents staff has noted some small details that may need to be altered prior to execution as well as some clarifications that may be needed. As no large issues have been identified at this time and given the time-sensitive nature of this project staff is recommending that Council authorize the Director Community and Protective Services to enter into both agreements when the small outstanding issues have been resolved to staff's satisfaction.

Background:

The Employee Attraction Retention Network (EARN) is a new initiative operating within the Rocky Mountain House/Caroline/Clearwater County region which aims to provide local businesses with new ideas and information on employee attraction and retention within the local community. EARN seeks to provide a forum for networking and economic development by bringing in professional speakers on issues pertaining to employee attraction and retention. The EARN Committee is led by AlbertaWorks, a division of the Alberta Ministry of Human Services and by the Rural Alberta Business Centre. The Committee also has representation from the Town, County, Career Assistance Network, Rocky Community Learning Centre and the Rocky Chamber of Commerce.

EARN plans to bring in several speakers throughout the year, and has their first event tentatively scheduled for October 29, 2013 with a presentation from Kristen Cumming on the intergenerational workplace. In the *Reeve's Economic Summit: Oil and Gas Working Group Report* provided to Council on June 25, 2013, one recommendation highlighted the importance of engaging with industry and economic specialists and



stakeholders, with the goal of enhancing the community's awareness and knowledge of trends, issues and solutions facing businesses. EARN's mandate aligns with a number of economic development items presented in the report, primarily being the attraction and retention of employees.

Participating partners on the EARN Committee share various in-kind and funding contributions to allow these events to take place. EARN is asking that County Council provide \$500 to go towards advertising the events that are planned for October, February and April.

The Town of Rocky Mountain House has agreed to advertise for EARN through different mediums the Town currently provides, including the Town electronic billboard, monthly newsletter and through social media. Currently, County Administration is working with EARN to utilize similar County initiatives, including the County Newsletter, website and social media platforms.

The funds EARN is requesting from the County would be used to buy advertising space locally and regionally in different newspaper publications, including The Mountaineer, The Western Star, and Central Alberta Life. Radio ads are also a possibility. If approved, the County's contribution would be recognized in the ads through logo placement, and partnership would be highlighted in all communications.

Funds are available within the Economic Development budget for miscellaneous advertising, should Council approve this request.
