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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This Case for Support ("Case") is for the third and final phase ("Phase 3") of the Camp Alexo Master Plan ("Master Plan"). Phase 3 replaces the lodge and dining facilities at a cost of \$965,658.

Camp Alexo has been serving children and families in Central Alberta since 1984. More than 22,500 children and families have benefited from Camp Alexo over the past 34 years. Camp Alexo's mandate from day one has been to provide a resource for children to grow and discover their potential regardless of financial or social barriers. 80% of the children who attend Camp Alexo are from economically disadvantaged families. To this date no child has ever been denied an opportunity to experience Camp Alexo due to financial barriers. To ensure Camp Alexo continues to meet that mandate a Master Plan was developed to address the capital needs and infrastructure for which to deliver the outcomes and ensure this resource continues to positively impact children and families well into the future. This Case includes the successes with Phases 1 and 2 of the Master Plan and outlines in detail Phase 3. The Master Plan represents a tremendous commitment from throughout Central Alberta. It relied on significant fundraising, private donor and business support, in-kind donations and volunteer commitment. With 98.5% of funds raised to complete the final phase we are so close to celebrating the completion of the Camp Alexo Master Plan. We are respectfully requesting the consideration of Clearwater County to contribute the final \$15,412 to get us over the finish line as we near completion of this project.

The entire 3 phases of the Master Plan represents a community investment of more than 2.5 million dollars, with more than 920 volunteers contributing more than 38,600 volunteer hours. This was all accomplished during the past 4 years in a tough economy, which is a testament of the level of support shared to make this happen. The last 10% of fundraising efforts has been very challenging to say the least. Donor fatigue and fundraising efforts have been exhausted. The generous contribution of three private donors and one anonymous donor was the catalyst to drive our efforts in the final phase.

Completion of the Master Plan will transform Camp Alexo from a seasonal summer camp to a year-round wilderness resource that will not only be accessible to the target population we serve, but also to groups throughout Clearwater County and Central Alberta looking for an accessible resource in the heart of David Thompson Country.

INTRODUCTION

Camp Alexo, an accredited camp with the Alberta Camping Association and a member of the Canadian Camping Association, has served Central Alberta since 1984. More than 22,500 children and youth have walked the trails at Camp Alexo. A key driver for Camp Alexo is the benefits a camp experience can have on a child growing up. Chldren need to unplug from technology on occasion and plug into the natural world around them to grow discover their potential. The Camp Alexo's original mandate, which remains true today, is every child who wishes to go to camp will have that opportunity regardless of social or financial barriers.

The public lands for which Camp Alexo is located (6.2 hectares) is leased by the Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Red Deer and District (BBBS) with programs and services operated through a collaborative partnership with the Boys and Girls Club of Red Deer & District (BGC). Both are registered charities based out of Youth HQ in Red Deer which provides shared administrative services and supports. This is a cost effective and efficient model – maximizing the impact of the public donated dollar. In addition, the needs of youth and families are addressed in a collaborative 'full circle' approach by utilizing services from a number of agencies and organizations we partner with.

BBBS is governed by a volunteer Board of Directors and is driven by a dedicated staff team who is supported by a caring group of more than 300 adult volunteers and business and community partners. Collectively and collaboratively over 1,700 children and youth are supported annually.

This Case for Support addresses capital and infrastructure needs of Camp Alexo. Without the infrastructure in place we could simply not achieve the desired impacts and outcomes. Refer to "Theory of Change" attached.

- 92% identified new friends while attending camp
- 86% get along better with adults and parents
- 89% indicated feeling a sense of belonging and being cared about.
- 82% develop more positive relationships
- 74% have a better attitude towards school
- 88% are introduced to new experiences
- 90% feel safe when they are at camp
- 79% expressed feeling valued

Our mission is "to empower children and youth to develop confidence and skills for life through knowledge, healthy relationships, and quality experiences."

Many may recall someone in their childhood who had a profound impact on who they are today. It may have been a caring adult who helped one discover themselves, recognized one's strengths or gave one the confidence to pursue goals. These experiences created lifetime memories. Our core values seek to create a foundation of support for children and youth to develop confidence, skills for life, and healthy relationships they can apply to being contributing members of society. All programs and services are accessible to all, regardless of social or financial barriers.

MASTER PLAN

In 2012- 2013 the Board of Directors directed a strategic process to evaluate the impact of Camp Alexo and to determine its future. This was accomplished through consultation with stakeholders throughout the community: volunteers, alumni, children and youth, and community organizations and agencies. The feedback that Camp Alexo is a valuable resource was overwhelming; it addresses the need for accessible and affordable opportunities for children, families and community. Another finding was the need to expand Camp Alexo to enhance its reach and impact.

This research also validated the need to create the Master Plan with community input. A key objective of the Master Plan was to have a blueprint to identify and address capital needs to ensure Camp Alexo would continue to fulfill its mandate for the next 50+ years. A three-phase plan comprised of facilities, infrastructure and the lodge was created with a three year completion timeline (2014 - 2017). (See enclosed memory drive for Camp Alexo Master Plan PowerPoint Presentation.)

PHASE 1 – Facilities (2014)

Phase 1 of the Master Plan was completed in the spring of 2014. On the weekend of June 5 - 7, 2014 more than 300 community volunteers and business friends completed a variety of projects to enhance and expand Camp Alexo's facilities. (See enclosed memory drive for the video of the Phase 1 project.)

The projects completed included construction or restoration of the following:

- New washroom and shower facilities
- New sports court
- Two new 22 person cabins
- New caretaker residence
- New central group main fire pit complete with seating and stage
- New entrance arch and gate
- Two activity stations with storage and a central fire circle
- An archery range
- Three new 26' tipis, summer accommodations
- New out-trip building for storage of adventure-based program equipment
- Conversion of a former cabin into an eco-education program activity building
- Renovation of three existing cabins
- Development of trails
- Extensive clean-up of trails and brush
- Expansion of service/maintenance area and additional storage facilities

PHASE 2 - Infrastructure (2015 - 2016)

Phase 2 focused on the following infrastructure:

- New well system with greater capacity to meet growing needs
- New septic system to service lodge and washhouse facilities
- New fencing and signage throughout
- Upgrading water system to meet Alberta Health Standards
- Upgrading power station
- Upgrading road and entrance
- Clearing bush to align with Alberta Forestry Fire Safe best practices

Phases 1 and 2 were accomplished through a community investment of \$1,560,000 with more than 850 skilled and unskilled caring volunteers donating over 36,400 hours.

PHASE 3 – Lodge (2017)

The final phase is the replacement of the lodge and dining building. The new lodge at 4,800 sq. ft. will double the footprint of the former building and cost approximately \$970,000. A detailed budget follows which includes confirmed funding, pending funding, in-kind support, and building costs. (lodge drawings attached)

Phase 3 in 2017/18 is required as the former building no longer met current updates to building, fire and health standards. It was deemed not prudent to spend funds to renovate due to the cost and the age of the current building at 33 years. In addition, the initial impetus to proceed was the recent generous support by three private donors. By leveraging that support we were able to secure a significant contribution from an anonymous donor, government funding and foundation support. This enabled us to proceed and are nearing completion of the final phase.

- 30% increase in participation from economically disadvantaged families.
- With capital facilities nearly complete enhanced program resources are being developed.
- Camp Alexo continues to be affordable and accessible to our target population.
- Inquiries with respect to access from within Clearwater County and throughout Central Alberta have increased dramatically.

Camp Alexo has been an active participating entity within Clearwater County since 1984. We partner and work with local area groups, businesses and individuals who share in promoting and protecting this special place we share in the heart of David Thompson Country.

Respectfully, the hope is it has been convincing.

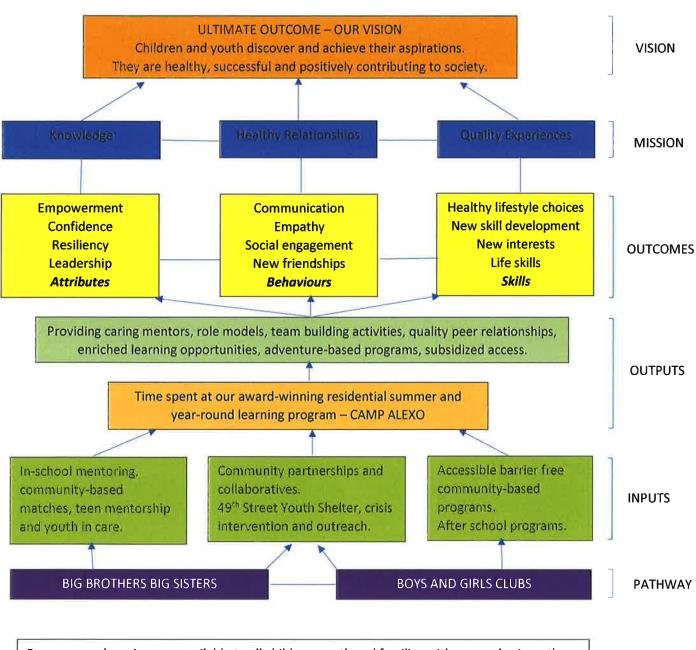

POLICY STATEMENT:

To recognize the importance of youth achievement in the area of community service and to encourage academic advancement, the County will offer an annual scholarship to worthy high school graduates.

DURATION: 5 years (may be extended upon evaluation by the Council in 2013)

VALUE: \$4,000 given annually - \$1,000 to one student graduating from each of the 4 High Schools in Clearwater County including West Central High School, St. Dominic High School, David Thompson High School and Caroline High School.

ELIGIBILITY:

- Any graduating student from a County High School registered and attending a post secondary school in a full time capacity;

 - o County residence legal location while attending high school;
 - Name of post secondary institution and the full time program enrolled in;
 - Any reference letters the applicant feels are helpful in confirming citizenship activities.

REVIEW AND SELECTION PURPOSE:

- Applications will be received and reviewed by the respective high school principal (or his/her designate) considering the contents of the written application, the observations of school staff through the time the applicant attended high school, and any other community references the principal deems appropriate to consult.
- The respective high school principal shall select the winning applicant and advise the county administrator for purposes of preparing a check.

 - e) Historical information on Road/intersection If the road historically had high truck volumes and a residence was constructed beside this road a sign may not be approved for installation.

During vacation time or any other time when the employee is off work for extended periods, the vehicle must be parked in the Clearwater County (Rocky) Public Works Yard and the keys left with the Fleet Supervisor or designate. 6. The Chief Administrative Officer or Department Director may temporarily authorize an employee to take a vehicle home provided the employee is on-call In cases where a staff member is on call or it can be demonstrated proven that taking the vehicle home is advantageous beneficial to cost effective for County the operations. of the other staff may be temporarily permitted to take a County vehicle home by the Department Director or the Chief Administrative Officer. 7. The personal usage (as defined by the Canada Revenue Agency) of County vehicles is a taxable
